The contemporary university building is both a laboratory for research and teaching, and an inspirational experience for the students. Hence the university building will be an ever-changing structure rather than an architectural monument.

Designed to be ever-changing and adaptable, the drivers of the design are – beside the architects - the academics and the students. Their active participation requires a constant critical engagement.

The envisaged process is web-based. The MSD Design Blog allows for the active incorporation of contributions by downloading and modifying the architect's 3D model and uploading alternative options and/or comments. Modifications are allowed for students and faculty members only; the debate, however, is open to a global audience.

Both the design and the construction phases will be implicated into the debate. Additionally webcams will monitor the construction and videocasts will ensure a worldwide attention for the Melbourne Design School over the next years.


Opening the process of design up to those that will actually use the facilities will also encourage a more active sense of belonging to the university for both staff and students alike.
